Integration in Network Architecture In a three-tier network model, the core switch sits at the top: Access Layer: Connects end-user devices such as computers, IP phones, and wireless access points. Distribution Layer: Aggregates traffic from access switches and applies policies like routing and filtering. Core Layer: The core switch aggregates all distribution traffic and routes it efficiently across the network or to the data center .
