

How to fuse fiber optic panels

Fusion splicing fiber optic cables involves precisely aligning and melting fiber ends to create a low-loss, permanent connection, which is then protected within a splice sleeve in the panel.

Step 1: Preparation of Fiber Cables Strip the outer jacket of the fiber cable using a cable stripper to expose the buffer tubes, typically 3-5 cm in length. Remove the buffer coating carefully to expose the bare fiber, avoiding tension or bending beyond a 30 mm radius. Step 3: Align and Splice Fibers Place the prepared fibers into the fusion splicer clamps. Ensure the splicer is on a stable surface and the fibers are free of dust. Use the splicer's alignment program to automatically align the fiber cores. Most modern splicers use core alignment for precise positioning. Activate the fusion cycle, which melts the fiber ends together using an electric arc, forming a continuous optical path with minimal reflection and attenuation.

Step 4: Protect the Splice After splicing, slide the heat-shrink sleeve over the fused joint and shrink it using a heat source integrated into the splicer or a separate oven. This protects the splice from mechanical stress and environmental factors, ensuring long-term reliability.

Step 5: Organize in the Panel Place the protected splice into the fiber optic panel tray, securing it according to the panel's design. Maintain proper bend radius and avoid sharp turns to prevent signal loss. Label fibers for easy identification and future maintenance.
