

Operating distance of distribution box switch box



Overview

The distance between the distribution box and the switch box should not exceed 30 meters, and the horizontal distance between the switch box and the fixed electrical equipment it controls should not exceed 3 meters. These distances indicate space that must be clear to the floor. The chart above illustrates the 8 essential formulas with worked examples - Ohm's Law, Watt's Law, voltage drop, transformer ratio.
