Industry Classification Telecommunications towers are considered part of the telecommunications infrastructure sector, which is a subset of the broader information and communications technology (ICT) industry. Companies like Indus Towers in India provide passive infrastructure services to mobile network operators, highlighting that the industry is primarily infrastructure-focused rather than service-focused. In other countries, the industry typically falls under the Ministry or Department of Telecommunications or equivalent, which handles licensing, spectrum allocation, and infrastructure regulation.
